Ah, summer. We wait all year for these three glorious months. There is so much to pack into that time. We love the long, lazy, sunny days at the pool with our friends; taking family vacations at our long dreamed of destination, enjoying baseball games for the kids and our Cardinals, and appreciating great outings with friends and family. Meals are usually from the grill, leaving little to clean up, with great salads and sides.

We always hear that you need to be careful about leaving your creamy salads out for too long to avoid spoiling. This is a great pasta salad that packs in so much flavor without the mayo. There's also the surprise of garbanzo beans mixed in to give you a bit of extra protein. Any pasta will work for this dish, just make sure it has nooks and crannies, and other little spaces for the flavors to hide.

Enjoy these last summer days, enjoy your friends and family, and enjoy your food. Life's too short to miss a good meal and your favorite glass of wine!

INGREDIENTS & DIRECTIONS

- · Chicken broth to cook pasta
- 1 ½ cups uncooked pasta
- · 1 (15-ounce) can garbanzo beans, drained and rinsed
- 1 ½ cups halved red and yellow grape tomatoes
- ½ cup finely chopped red onion or shallots
- ½ cup chopped fresh basil leaves
- ¼ cup chopped fresh mint leaves
- ½ cup chopped parsley
- · ¾ cup Red Wine Vinaigrette, recipe below
- · Salt and freshly ground black pepper

Pour chicken broth into a large saucepan. Cover the pan and bring the broth to a boil over high heat. Stir in the pasta. Cook until pasta is tender but still firm to the bite, according to package directions. Drain the pasta through a strainer. Transfer the pasta to a large wide bowl and toss until the pasta cools slightly. Stir in about ¼ cup red wine vinaigrette (recipe follows). Set aside to cool completely.

Toss the pasta with the beans, tomatoes, onion, basil, mint, and parsley. Add additional vinaigrette to coat. Season the salad, to taste, with salt and pepper, and serve at room temperature

Red Wine Vinaigrette:

- ½ cup red wine vinegar
- 1/4 cup fresh lemon juice
- 1 tablespoon honey
- 2 teaspoons salt
- ¾ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 1 cup extra-virgin olive oil

Mix the vinegar, lemon juice, honey, salt, and pepper in a blender. With the machine running, gradually blend in the oil. Season the vinaigrette, to taste, with more salt and pepper, if desired.

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

Recently, a friend lured me west with the prospect of exploring one of the most iconic landmarks in the country -- the Grand Canyon. Having never been there, the prospect of adventure was too good to pass up, so I booked a flight and headed west.

After a couple of days on the road, we arrived on the South Rim of the Grand Canyon after dark. Excitement and anticipation were building as we sorted gear for the hike.

Eventually, we arrived at the river, letting the cool water soothe our aching feet. Another mile on, and we arrived at Phantom Ranch, happy to shed our shoes and drop our bags. We talked with other guests in the canteen over dinner, and then it was time for bed. We were WIPED OUT and had to be up before dawn for the long hike out.

We woke to sore calves and aching shoulders. The previous day had taken its toll, but we had to get on the trail if we were going to beat the storm. Donning headlamps, we grabbed our backpacks and shuffled out of the bunkhouse.

It was damp. Mist hung in the air as we trudged out of camp. A coffee at the canteen brightened spirits, but we knew we were in

for a long uphill slog. One step at a time, we made our way back to the river, across the bridge, and began the climb out of the canyon.

Dawn broke, the sky grey, the air heavy. Mist turned to drizzle, drizzle to rain as we mounted the switchbacks up from the river.

Heads down, we hiked on, climbing the canyon walls. The temperature dropped as elevation increased. We could see snow massing on the cliffs above. The storm had hit, shrouding the rim in clouds.

Rain turned to sleet, sleet to snow, and before we knew it, we were hiking in a Winter Wonderland. The snow was wet, sticking to trees and rocks along the path. It was great for hiking - the heavy snow provided better traction than wet rocks or mud. Laughing, we embraced the elements - It was an incredible experience - Hiking the Grand Canyon in a blizzard!

Finally, we reached the rim, greeted by 8 inches of fresh powder at the trailhead. Exhausted, soaked, sore, but content. We had seen the very best of the Grand Canyon - two extreme opposites, and one incredible adventure!

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



They have a great breakfast menu (try the French toast or the biscuits and gravy) and lunch menu (try the turkey & bacon club, the lasagna, or one of their pizzas), as well as bakery cases filled with mouth-watering, delicious items such as Brookies (a brownie-cookie treat), cupcakes, cheesecake, cookies, muffins, cake pops...the list goes on! Their most popular item is the Chipwich - you will have to trust me when I tell you that it's amazing! They can also make custom cakes for birthdays, special occasions, and weddings. ...and it's all gluten-free! They have a retail "grab 'n go" case for people who want on-the-go selections, as well as the ability to order online, too. They also offer wholesale and catering options, too.

When I asked Lillie to share some of her favorite reactions from people who are visiting for the first time she said one word – tears. She told me that people drive 2-3 hours to come to NEW DAY; a place where they can eat anything on the menu and not be worried that it's going to make them sick. It brings tears to people's eyes, and that's the reaction that Lillie said makes all of the long hours worth it.

Her favorite story is about a 10-year-old boy with Celiac whose mom surprised him by bringing him to NEW DAY. She had shared with Lillie that he had stopped going to friends' birthday parties and dreaded party days at school because he couldn't eat the same stuff as the other kids. He was tired of feeling different. When he walked in and saw the

bakery cases he said to his mom, "Why would you bring me here – I can't eat ANYTHING!" ...she said, "Actually, you can eat EVERYTHING!". He jumped up and down and was crying when he

realized that he didn't have to worry about being different any longer now that these tasty treats were an option.

Leaving with \$100 in baked goods and delicious dishes in-hand, mom and son were both very happy ...and very full.



I encourage you to give NEW DAY a try, regardless of whether you eat gluten-free or not. I can attest that everything on the menu does taste as good, if not better than its full-of-gluten counterpart (the Brookie I bought last time didn't even make it out of the parking lot!). NEW DAY isn't just a place for people with food allergies to eat – it's a place for everyone to eat. It's evident that Lillie and staff have poured their heart and soul into make sure it's not only a great place for people who NEED to eat there but for people who WANT to eat there, as well.
