
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

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
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# ANNUAL TRUSTEES' MEETING UPDATE



Last month, we held our annual meeting for all subdivision Trustees. It's been an annual affair for fifteen plus years. The purpose is to exchange information on problems and effective methods to solve them. The City hosts these meetings and provides updates on matters, like the City's financial budget, ask the police to speak and answer questions, etc. These meet-

ings bring to mind the various laws, rules we live by in our nation, state, city and subdivisions. All civilized nations (particularly USA) are structured in some form to serve its citizens. We often hear the expression 'a nation of laws'. In our case, it starts with the U.S. Constitution works through to subdivisions.

Side bar - the subdivision Trustee's meeting was outstanding. You can be very proud of your leaders. Always look to thank them.

We understand that all civilized societies must have rules (laws) for its citizens to be able to live peacefully together. I don't wish to go into a dissertation on the philosophy of modern civilizations. Let's look at the ways in which this philosophy applies to you, a citizen of Clarkson Valley. Just as states were created by the United States Constitution, cities are formed in accordance with State Law. In other words, the State by statue could eliminate Cities (not likely), which means, the State can (and often does) stipulate ways in which Cities can operate. A recent example of this type effort - a law that sets the percentage of traffic fees the City could retain. City ordinances within the State law are passed to define, in more detail, the rules for living in their community. An example, vehicle speed limits, ordinances

concerning property maintenance, will vary from city to city still allowed by State law.

Subdivisions can and often do have more specifics related to property, still in compliance with City ordinances, but want a distinct rule - an example might be a prohibition on fences. These subdivision rules are called Indentures. These are rules you committed to when you moved into your residence. This becomes a contract between you and your subdivision. Indentures get much more detailed and, by definition, relate to a specific subdivision.

Let's review why you might even care about all this. Winter is finally gone and you are looking to making some changes in your property - perhaps a new deck, pool, add-on, etc. The City ordinance requires a building permit. Your subdivision indentures may (most do) require the same information as the building permit, or it may require more or less. In other words, having a City permit to build on your property may not be all that is necessary. Your subdivision Trustees may need approval also. I explain this as a courtesy in assisting you in the procedure because the City is not involved in the process with your subdivision nor the decision made by your subdivision. The City building permit could be approved; however, that does not ensure the subdivision approval. The City will not enforce the subdivision rules, regulations.







# Mini Beef WELLINGTONS

Spring is upon us. There is so much going on – Mother's Day, Father's Day, Graduations, Wedding celebrations, the list is endless!

It would be awesome to have a fabulous "go-to" entrée to wow your guests. Well, I've got you covered. Elegant dining doesn't



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have to take hours. Who has that much time this season? These Wellingtons make you look, and they taste, like you spent tons of time to please the ones you love. Roast some baby potatoes, add your favorite vegetable or salad and you have a meal fit for your honored guests!

### INGREDIENTS

- 1 shallot
- $\cdot$  1 Tablespoon unsalted butter
- 3 ½ table spoon olive oil, divided
- 4 beef tenderloin steaks, approx. 5 oz. each cut 1 inch thick
- · Kosher salt
- · Ground black pepper
- 4 heaping teaspoons stone ground mustard
- 4 tablespoons grated gruyere cheese
- Flour for rolling out pastry
- 1 sheet puff pastry thawed
- 1 egg, beaten
- · Course sea salt for garnish

### DIRECTIONS

Peel shallot and cut in half lengthwise, then crosswise into ½-inch thick slices. Melt butter and 1½ tablespoons oil in large, heavy skillet over medium heat. Add shallots; reduce to medium-low. Cook, stirring frequently, until shallots are nicely browned and tender, about 10 minutes. Remove from heat.

Salt and pepper both sides of each steak to taste. Add the remaining 2 tablespoons of olive oil to heated skillet, then sear the steaks for 1 minute per side. Transfer steaks to plate and let cool for 5 minutes. Top each steak with shallots, a heaping teaspoon of mustard and a tablespoon of cheese.

Flour work surface and roll puff pastry into a 12-inch square. Cut pastry into four 6-inch squares. Brush beaten egg around the pastry in a  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch border. Reserve the remaining egg.

Place a pastry square over each steak. Carefully lift the meat and press the pastry around its sides, then seal tightly on bottom. Place wellingtons on a lightly oiled baking sheet. Refrigerate for at least 45 minutes.

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Brush the tops and sides with the reserved beaten egg. Sprinkle each wellington with a pinch of kosher or sea salt.

Roast on the middle oven rack until pastry in golden brown. Your meat thermometer should read 145 for medium-rare, 160 for medium, and 170 for well done. Transfer wellingtons to a rack and rest for 5 minutes before serving.





# Kansas City...Kansas City, HERE WE COME!

This month, 'Finding The Adventure' meant staying local - a weekend spent exploring Kansas City. I know what you're thinking - 'Nick, you've written about quitting your job and moving to New Zealand, traveling the world, almost getting trampled by a rhino in Nepal... You're gonna tell me KANSAS CITY was an 'Adventure'? Riiiiiiiight...'

Yes, I am. Bear with me...

I've never spent much time in Kansas City mainly because I've never had reason to. Now, I'm dating a beautiful girl who is an alumna of UMKC's School of Dance, and she's been wanting to show me around her college stomping grounds for awhile. That, combined with UMKC hosting its annual Spring Dance Expo, provided plenty of reason to venture cross-state.

She also promised Kansas City BBQ as a reward for my accompanying her to the dance show. That sealed it.

'We're going to Kansas City! Kansas City, here we come!'

At just over 200 miles, it took just under 3 1/2 hours to drive to KC. It was an easy drive (save a few slowpokes plodding along in the left lane), and before we knew it, we were pulling in, dropping our bags, and heading out to meet friends for dinner.

The first thing I noticed about Kansas City was that everything seemed close together. All weekend, regardless of where we were headed, it was never more than 10-15 minutes away, which made moving around the city a cinch. For example, we ate dinner that first night on the sidewalk at La Bodega, a popular tapas restaurant off Southwest Blvd, and then headed to Julep, a happening cocktail lounge in the busy Westport area which was just a few miles south. The 'just a few minutes away' theme remained constant throughout the weekend, and I came to appreciate the closeness of KC.

The weekend FLEW by! In addition to the dance performance, we packed A TON into those 72 hours: a tour of The Roast-

erie - a local coffee company that specializes in air-roasted coffee (DELICIOUS); a walk through the Kemper Museum of Contemporary Art and a well-earned nap on the lawn at the Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art; window shopping in The Plaza; brunch at Room 39, wings at The Peanut, KC-style BBQ at Joe's; drinks at Julep, Tom's Town (a small distillery on Main Street named after politician Tom Pendergast - famous for flouting federal laws during Prohibition), and Manifesto (a dimly-lit speakeasy accessed via a tiny staircase off a loading dock down a back alley).
