

Reminders

November is often referred to as the beginning of the holiday season. It seems that it comes from the fact we celebrate two national holidays in November, and then Christmas comes so quickly after Thanksgiving. The first November national holiday is Veteran's Day. This monthly publication is a salute to our veterans. I was in the Air Force during the Korean War. I never served in a combat unit, nor was I in any combat mission, so I salute those 'real' veterans with praise and a heartfelt "Thank You!" We are still the greatest country ever on this planet, and our veterans are one of the primary reasons. I believe we will and we must work through our differences as an honor to those who have served.

As I was thinking about our Veterans, the police and other first responders came to mind. Our new police (Chesterfield as of 7-1-17) remind us each month with their report 'garage doors still up' after midnight in many houses. Veterans and police share in one of their missions - SAFETY FIRST.

I looked back and found many of my previous November Mayor's Corners talked about an important reminder or new safety tip. I don't know about you, but we do have fire alarms in our home, and my wife reminds me to test them more often than I do on my own. We do, on occasion (but not often), wonder about carbon monoxide, too. Frequently called the invisible killer, carbon monoxide is an invisible odorless, colorless gas created when fuels (such as gasoline, wood, coal, natural gas, propane, oil, and methane) burn incompletely. In the home, heating and cooking equipment that burn fuel can be sources of carbon monoxide. Even though called an invisible killer, there are symptoms to be aware of: a headache, dizziness, nausea. When symptoms get worse, confusion and drowsiness can lead to fast breathing, fast heartbeat, vision problems, and even seizures.

With winter coming on, and with houses being more closed up, I wanted to share a few reminders of actions to avoid carbon monoxide (CO) build up:

- If you use a generator in an emergency, be sure it's used in a well-ventilated location outdoors away from windows, doors and vent openings.
- Gas and charcoal grills can produce CO always use these items outside.
- Make sure your vents for the dryer, furnace, stove, and fireplace are clean and clear of debris. Double check for snow after a snowstorm.
- Do not to run a vehicle or other fueled engines in the garage with the garage door closed, or even with it open. CO can leak into the house in either case.
- Make sure the exhaust pipe of a running vehicle is clear, i.e. not covered with snow.
- Have fuel-burning heating equipment including chimneys inspected by a professional every year before cold weather.
- When using your chimney, be sure the flue is open for adequate ventilation.

Hopefully, these common-sense reminders can be helpful. To better ensure, there are CO alarms. They should be installed outside each sleeping area on every level of your home. You can talk with a qualified appliance technician to discuss possible needs for your home.



Did You Know?

Our national holiday really stems from the feast held in the autumn of 1621 by the Pilgrims and the Wampanoag to celebrate the colony's first successful harvest.

The first Thanksgiving feast lasted three days, providing enough food for 53 pilgrims and 90 Native Americans. The feast consisted of fish (cod, eels, and bass) and shellfish (clams, lobster, and mussels), wild fowl (ducks, geese, swans, and turkey), venison, berries and fruit, vegetables (peas, pumpkin, beetroot and possibly, wild or cultivated onion), harvest grains (barley and wheat), and beans, dried Indian maize or corn, and squash.

His unit provided all the communication for the Air Force which included the daily "morning report." Every day, his unit would track the number of airmen on duty, off duty, where they were located, and track the routes for the planes. He and his unit also reported any problems with communication equipment and if it needed fixing. After serving two years of active duty, Scott served six more years in the reserve to complete his commitment and was honorably discharged as a Captain.

When asked what he gained from serving in the military, he says, "The military gave me an opportunity to gain more maturity as a young adult. We had to follow strict rules in a controlled environment which helped me to grow in my own personal life and in relationships with other people. My active duty time was during the Korean War. My unit was not in a combat zone; we were one of the support units. Another lesson learned in team dynamics on a large scale."

VETERAN JIM BARRY





VETERAN CLIFF WEEKS

On November 19, 1963, Cliff Weeks, who is married to Kay and resides in Forest Hills, was drafted into the Army and sent to Fort Leonard Wood for Basic Infantry Training. The third day there, President Kennedy was assassinated, and the entire base went on alert for a few days. It was a little scary at the time.

Following basic training, he was sent to Military Police Training at Fort Gordon outside Augusta, Georgia. Upon completion of this training, he was sure he would be sent to Vietnam where most of his peers were headed. Not so, and to his surprise, orders put Cliff on a train to Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas, where he became a member of the 1ST Guard Company, United States Disciplinary Barracks, Fort Leavenworth, Kansas. He worked death row and "The Hole" (officially known as disciplinary segregation) most of his time there.

In early May 1964, after being at Ft. Leavenworth only three months, the First Sergeant called together all the members of the company not on duty at the time and asked if anyone held the Red Cross Lifesaving Certification. Cliff did, but early on in the Army, he was advised not to volunteer for anything. He stood there for a while uncertain whether to respond or not. He finally raised his hand. Yes!!

That simple "yes" led him to spend both summers working as a lifeguard at the post swimming pools. He says, "that duty wasn't bad at all! And as for working in the prison, while it was not the best duty one could have, it sure beat being sent to Vietnam."



VETERAN GENE LEVY

Gene was born in 1933 in New York City. As a child, he experienced the instability of WWII with his family relocating to Upstate New York and then to Cleveland, OH, because of his father's work on government construction projects.

Gene enlisted in the USAF at age 18, serving from November 1951 until September 1955. His first year in service was spent attending school in Electronics and Instrumentation and Flight Control Systems. After training, he was assigned to the 2259th Reserve Troop Carrier Squadron which was activated due to the Korean War (from June 1950-July 1953).







I had the pleasure of meeting Lee Reid over a leisurely lunch at Forest Hills. Lee and his wife, Kathy, have resided in Forest Hills for 40 years and are blessed to have their daughter, Tiffany Durham, and her family on the same street! Lee and Kathy have 2 grown children and 4 grandchildren. I was honored to spend time with Lee, learning about his fascinating experiences in life and what they meant to him. He is a very accomplished man who was so easy to talk to, but he is also very humble. With that being said, I received the information on his honors and awards from Tiffany and Kathy.

Tennis has been a major part of Lee's life and he has been playing tennis since the 8th grade, after, he says, *"I couldn't seem to hit the baseball out of the infield!"* His childhood home was Los Angeles, CA and he played for Huntington Park High School and Inglewood High School as well. Lee was offered a full ride to Pepperdine which was then located in Watts, CA, but he turned it down, and instead, chose to go to University of California, Santa Barbara, (UCSB) where he played all four years on their tennis team. Surprisingly, this was the first time 2 tennis players were nominated, the other nominee being the famous tennis player Arthur Ashe. Each University of California campus chose their nominee for leadership and academic excellence in the sports community. It was quite an accomplishment to be a finalist. Perhaps the award that he is most proud of is being selected for the UCSB Hall of Fame in 1973. I also found

out that Lee was well-acquainted with Arthur Ashe and Bill Jean King. He and Billy Jean (who was already playing professionally) would occasionally practice early in the morning together. Both benefited from each other by sharing new techniques.

Lee went on to graduate school where he continued to play tennis. He completed his Masters in History at UCSB. In 1964, Lee had to put his racquet away for some time while he fulfilled his military obligations through the ROTC program, where they assigned him to the Army Intelligence branch. 25 years later, he picked his racquet back up when he joined the USA Tennis Association, which he found to be a great program.

Being a forward thinker, he states staying active "will add life to your years and years to your life." Members of this program are eligible to participate in tournaments until they are 90 years old! Lee has been playing in tournaments now for the past 25 years and many have taken him as far as to Germany, Poland, and Australia. Lee says his tennis days are beginning to "wind down" but he plans on playing competitively for 3-6 more years. Lee enjoys playing Monday night double's at Woodsmill Racquet Club as well as playing with daughter Tiffany. What Lee likes most about tennis is that it is a "sport" for a lifetime and will keep you healthy and in shape.






A CONVERSATION BETWEEN

Zach Howard And His Papa Ron, A Vietnam Veteran

Zach is lucky to have his papa right here in St. Louis. His papa is retired Dr. Ron Wilbois from Town and Country. Zach, 11, lives in Dunhill and attends St. John Lutheran School where he is in the 6th grade. One day, while visiting his papa at his home at The Sheridan, they had this amazing conversation about his papa's time as a Captain in the Vietnam War.

ZACH INTERVIEWING HIS PAPA:

Zach: Tell me about what you did in the military. Papa: I was in the army, in the 25th infantry division in the medical battalion company C. I was the commanding officer and stationed in Cu Chi, South Vietnam. My rank was Captain and I oversaw four doctors, one dentist, and 120 corpsmen. I was also in charge of building the hospital. To accomplish this, we traded uniforms and boots for equipment (such as bulldozers and backhoes). Everything was built through borrowing, trading, or stealing. It was also very important that we had refrigeration for medical supplies.

Zach: What frightened you when you were in Vietnam away from mom, my aunt, and my grandma?

Papa: I was frightened when the mortars came in right outside of our camp. I would have to crawl through the field to get to the bunkers and I was afraid I would get hit.

Zach: Do you remember any good things when you were over there?

Papa: Your grandma used to send me powdered Kool-Aid because the water tasted so bad. We would give candy to the Vietnamese children and they would be so happy. I also felt good when I went into the village to deliver a baby or help villagers with medical problems. Another somewhat funny story is when we were in Tay Ninh one night putting up tents when we thought we were being ambushed by the Viet Kong. Our artillery unit started firing only to learn that it was a herd of water buffalo!

Zach: What were some bad things you remembered?

Papa: First, it was VERY HOT. Sometimes it got to 135 degrees. However, that was nothing compared to how difficult it was when helicopters brought injured soldiers to us from the battlefield. This was very traumatic for me. It was also devastating when a child from the village would wander near our camp and be mistaken for a Vietcong.

Zach: What did you learn about life by being in the war? Papa: I learned that nothing is permanent in life. Through this experience, I learned how precious life is.

PAPA INTERVIEWING ZACH: Papa: What do you think of war?

Zach: I think war is stupid. People react too quickly over arguments and don't take time to work things out.

Papa: What's one way you think the world will be different when you're my age?

Zach: I think global warming will be solved, we will have flying cars, and everything will be solar-powered. I also think we will have discovered other forms of life in the universe.

Papa: What do you think you will be doing at the age I was at (28) when I was in the war?

Zach: I think I will be a scientist. I want to be able to change the world in a positive way...maybe find a cure for cancer because I think they almost have found a cure for diabetes. I also think I will design and build robots. I will probably live in an apartment and may be married and have kids. How do I know? I am only a kid!

Papa: Who is your hero and why?

Zach: Albert Einstein. I love the way he did poorly in school and people didn't believe in him and then he became one of the greatest geniuses of all times! I love his discoveries and inventions!

Papa: If you could change one thing about the world, what would it be?


Zach: To have world peace and no more wars. I would also want to know before I die if I am going to heaven.





Meet WWII Marine Veteran

John (Jack) Muller

I had such a pleasure spending time with Jack Muller and his wife of 65 years Rita learning about Jack's time spent in WWII. What he experienced in WWII was very difficult, but it's an important piece of history worth sharing.

Jack grew up in South St. Louis at Broadway and Osceola. He decided to enlist in the Marine Corps in 1944 at the age of 17 because he knew he would be drafted when he turned 18. The war had been going on since September 1st, 1939, and Jack was involved in the war against Japan. He was a corporal in the 1st Marine Division and was sent to Okinawa where he operated an LVT. The Landing Vehicle Tracked (LVT) is an amphibious warfare vehicle and amphibious landing craft, introduced by the United States Navy.

Jack carried command officers in his LVT, used it to land troops to shore, deliver supplies to the front line in the Battle of Okinawa, and to carry the dead and wounded back to base camp.

When the battle at Okinawa ended, Jack and his comrades were given a short rest before they were to go to Japan. They heard talk of an "atomic bomb" being dropped in Japan. Due to this event, he was diverted to North China to be present at the Japanese surrender. Perhaps the most moving picture Jack showed to me was his First Marine Division's cemetery (there were of four - two Army and two Marine). If you look at the picture shown, you cannot even see how many crosses are present because the cemetery is so vast. Jack states that 400,000 American soldiers lost their lives in WWII, a number that is incomprehensible to most.

After returning from war, Jack enrolled at St. Louis University where he received a degree in Commerce and Finance. He met Rita (his wife of 65 years) at that time when she was attending Webster College. Jack went to work for GM for 11/2 years, and Peat Marwick Mitchell CPA firm. He then got his CPA and opened his own CPA firm.

Believe or not, this very accomplished 91-year-old just retired one year ago on June 2nd, 2016!

Jim's company ran many search-and-destroy missions and their first big contact with the Vietcong was on November 14th, 1965. The 7th Calvary was airlifted into LZ (landing zone) X-ray fight in the Ia Drang Valley. This 6-week battle was considered the first significant battle of the Vietnam war with so many American lives lost. In Jim's OCS class of 4-65, 20 of its men were in the battle, Jim included, and they lost three in the fight. His unit, the 5th Calvary, arrived on the 2nd day of this battle at LZ-X-ray by foot, where they made immediate contact with the enemy and continued fighting for two more days. (For more detail on this battle, read the book, We Were Soldiers Once, and Young, by Lt. General Harold G. Moore and Joseph L. Galloway, or watch the movie "We Were Soldiers", starring Mel Gibson, to understand what Jim went through. Jim cannot remember a lot of details from that battle

Jim returned to the US after being wounded a second time in August of 1966 from a hand grenade. He then went back to Ft. Benning to the OCS school as an Executive Officer. Originally there were five companies in the OCS school. When he got back there were 25 companies due to the increased need for 2nd Lieutenants. Jim stayed six months and was promoted to Captain and put in charge of the Drill and Command section at the Army Infantry School in Ft. Benning in 1967. He was married in December of 1966 he and his wife were expecting their first. A month before he got out, his baby girl was born and the Army wanted to give him a regular Army commission. He chose not to accept because he would have had to immediately return to Vietnam while having a new baby at home. Thus, Jim finished his obligation to the military on Nov. 18 of 1967. His family returned to Chicago where Jim got a job with Shell Oil Company. He remained employed there for 31 years and then was transferred to St. Louis in 1996 and retired in 1999.

"Not a day goes by that I don't think of my years in the Army. The military took a young man fresh out of college and taught me values that have lasted my entire life. People have asked me if I often think of my service in Vietnam and my answer is - **Every day of my life! Would I do it again? YES!**"

This support included real-time missions along with mass casualties training for various types of environments encountered, whether in the US or on the battlefield. The real-time missions included providing immunizations, medical record reviews, and quad-annual physicals for the Guard and Reserves. She was the Officer in Charge of the Immunization Team and the Medical Entrance Processing Satiation (MEPS). In 2004, she retired at the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. Gina states "Being a part of the U.S. Army Reserves for over twenty years gives me a great sense of pride for belonging to something much larger than myself. Without the many individuals that still volunteer every day in the Army and Army Reserves, our large fighting force that keeps all of us safe and free would be in great jeopardy. I belong to several veteran's or military organizations where I can give my time in the form of volunteerism. Over the years, the Army has had several slogans; the one I like the most is, "Be all you can be!"

Jim Kohoutek of Forest Hills was born and raised in Yankton, South Dakota. Jim's parents were friends with resident Senator Chandler Gurney who offered Jim an appointment to the US Naval Academy in Annapolis, MD. At that time, Jim was in college at Iowa State but accepted the appointment as it was offered to very few.

He graduated in 1954, and six days later, he married Mary Ann, with whom he grew up with since age four. Soon after, Jim was commissioned as an Ensign in the Navy. He went to, what he called the "Black Shoe Navy" (which is a term used to describe shipboard or 'surface' officers and senior enlisted members, due to the black footwear worn while in khaki uniform) for three months in Japan on the USS Hanson. While there for a few months, he was asked to go to flight training in Pensacola, FLA, to be a Navy fighter pilot. Jim graduated in 1956 and received his pilot wings. After graduation, he was assigned to the VF 122 Fighter Squadron.

He was stationed in San Diego, CA and would go on "cruises" (a ship deployment from home port, usually lasting between five and nine months) to the Pacific. The cruises Jim went on were in-between the Korean and Vietnam war. His squadron practiced all the time for the possibility of war. Some of his missions were taking off from aircraft carriers, flying, and then returning to land on the moving carrier. This was quite difficult and he lost three of his squadron pilots to accidents during landing.

Jim finished his commitment and then stayed two more years before being honorably discharged in 1964. The last airplane he flew was the F4, made by McDonnell Douglas. After leaving the Navy, Jim landed a position at McDonnell Douglas in their marketing department. He stayed for 22 years and then retired at age 55. He and Mary Ann have five children and six grandchildren.

When I asked Jim what he learned from his military career he said, "I learned how to take orders, said a lot of "Yes Sirs," and was taught discipline that has helped me greatly in my life."

Meet National Guard Veteran Edward Harper

Edward resides with his wife, Joan in Kehrswood. He grew up in western Kentucky but moved to St. Louis in high school. After high school, Ed attended SIU in Alton for a year and a half before he decided to voluntarily enlist in the military. He first went to Ft. Riley, Kansas, to train for the National Guard. From there, he was sent to Ft. Brag, North Carolina to be in the 82nd Airborne Division Support Outfit for active duty.

At that time, President Kennedy and the Premier of the Soviet Union, Nikita Khrushchev, were in a standoff in what is known as the Cuban Missile Crisis. Khrushchev promised Cuba he would protect their country from the U.S. and be their ally by sending nuclear missiles to Cuba. This very-real threat lead Kennedy to order a naval blockade to prevent Russian ships from delivering the missiles for the Cuban sites. This was as close as the world has ever been to a nuclear war.

Edward's support outfit oversaw all communications and radio communications with the 82nd Airborne. Thankfully, Khrushchev backed down and Kennedy avoided a nuclear disaster. Ed and his comrades were given a medal from John. F. Kennedy.

After the Cuban Missile Crisis, Ed returned to St. Louis and joined the Missouri National Guard which was stationed at Lambert Field and finished his enlistment at the Old Army Building at Grand and Hwy 40 in 1964.



for the Vietnam war. Fred and Patty did not have the money to get married so they wed in civil court. They were "officially" married in August of 1965. Kennedy was assassinated and President Johnson took his place and re-instated the draft.

In 1967, Fred was offered an opportunity to move to St. Louis to be a Junior Executive and Brown Shoe Co. It was hard to leave the East Coast, but he loved St. Louis and found it a great place to raise a family. One year later he was surprised by a draft notice and entered the military in March of 1968. Fred was assigned to the Americal Division and served in Vietnam in 1969. While there, he was wounded and awarded a Purple Heart, as well as the Army Commendation Medal. He returned home, only to be sent back 43 days later! Back in Vietnam, he served as Staff Sergeant for his remaining tenure. Once home, he returned to his career at Brown Shoe Company.

Fred continues his career in the shoe industry and is presently the Executive Officer for Footwear Unlimited and will be retiring this December. Fred has endured many difficult times in the last few years, especially the loss of his beloved "Sweet Patty." He fondly remembers how she always made herself look special when he got home from work. Instead of letting this loss pull him down, he has chosen to focus on the positive. He tells me he is so thankful and so grateful to have had the love of his life for 51 years. Fred and Patty have two grown children, Cara, 41, who is in the Arts, and Michael, 46, an entrepreneur.

With so many vast experiences to draw from, Fred has found four things he finds most important in life.

MEET ARMY VETERAN AARON WILDT,

OWNER OF WILDT INSURANCE AGENCY - FARMERS INSURANCE (314) 984-9055

I recently had the opportunity to interview Aaron Wildt, Army Veteran, owner of a Farmers Insurance agency and a Sponsor of your Clarkson Valley Living publication.

I think it best if Aaron tells you about his time in the Army in his own words:

"In 1991, shortly after the United States had invaded Iraq during Operation Desert Storm, at the age of 18, I made the decision to join the Army. It would have happened sooner, but my mom wouldn't sign the papers when I was 17 because she wasn't a fan of the idea.

I spent 13 weeks in Fort Benning, Georgia for Basic Training, and then my Advanced Individual Training at the Army Infantry School.

After graduation, me and 50 of my fellow graduates were flown to Schofield Barracks in Hawaii to serve with the 25th Infantry Division. I was then placed with Bravo Company 1/27th Infantry Regiment, one of the best Infantry Battalions in the Army.

While with the 25th, I had the opportunity to earn my Expert Infantry Badge (EIB) which showed I could competently complete over 40 actions that an Infantry soldier must be able to perform to the militaries highest standards. I also earned my Air Assault Wings by graduating from Air Assault school and learning how to rappel out of a helicopter.

In 1992, my unit performed the humanitarian mission of cleaning up after Hurricane Iniki, which was a category 4 Hurricane that hit the Hawaiian Islands. We spent over a month helping the people of the Island of Kauai get the roadways cleared, power back in force for the entire Island, and cleaning up all the trees that were *littering the island.*

Of course, we were also constantly training to be ready for any threat to our Country. If you ever see any service member with an Electric Strawberry on their shoulder, they are a member of the 25th Infantry Division. Tropic Lightning!"

About a week after leaving the Army Aaron was home in Columbia, MO and started college at Mizzou. There, he would study History and Geography as he intended to become a teacher.

During his senior year, things changed in his life that set him on a new course.

"I was picked up by a buddy and we went out for dinner. On the way home, a car came into our lane and forced us off the road. We flew through a ditch and crashed into a telephone pole. My buddy, who was driving, wasn't wearing his seatbelt and I was. The impact caused our heads to smash together and he ended up completely on my side of the vehicle with a broken back and shattered pelvis. I suffered massive head trauma and was actually pronounced DOA before they got me to the hospital. Fortunately, they didn't stop trying to resuscitate me and brought me back. However, I was in a coma for three weeks and once awake I had

months and months of rehab to learn to walk and speak again." Aaron shared that the end result, and one of the reasons he is so passionate about his career, was that he had over \$200K in medical bills. His friend was under-insured by having only the state minimum coverage. The other driver left the scene so there was only the coverage that his friend had in place.

After he finally graduated, Aaron taught briefly. "I, unfortunately, didn't have the ability to teach history or geography due to my Aaron, thanks for sponsoring Clarkson Valley Living and injury. I simply couldn't remember all that I need to. I did, howev-THANK YOU for your service! er, have the ability to teach math and gave that a chance. I found Do you know any amazing businesses that would be great partners that it simply wasn't for me after all," Aaron shared. ...

Ultimately, he went back to school to get his Masters in Business Administration, and that was when Farmers Insurance reached out to him about operating his own agency.




