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
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DEER POPULATION UPDATE



The warmer days of summer have dwindled and school is in full swing. So a little time to reflect on this summer's activities seems appropriate. You may wish to log in some new ideas for next year. As I was reflecting, a look at my new landscaped front yard was not inspiring. The bare stalks that once held blooms were not a beautiful sight. My fellow

outdoor inhabitants had feasted - deer. I'm sure you have seen and or had similar experiences with our deer population.

Deer in neighborhoods can be a problem -- they are a beautiful animal and besides, they were here first! For Clarkson Valley, living with our deer population has its plusses and minuses. Most of us, over the years, have enjoyed the excitement of sighting a fawn or buck with a big rack.

The population continues to be a problem; however, it's not at the panic level. The problem with high numbers of deer are: road safety, over-eating of forested areas, damage to landscaping and gardens, Lyme disease and the sheer number makes it difficult to maintain a healthy population.

We have been addressing this population problem for some 14 years. Working with the Missouri Department of Conservation, St. Louis County, and a committee of west county cities formed in 2003, we were the first St. Louis County municipality to allow a citizen to authorize a hunt on their property. To refresh the rules:

A homeowner may authorize a hunt on his or her property.

The authorized hunt must be during the archery hunting season as defined by the State of Missouri.

Archery devices are the only hunting device allowed.

All hunters must have completed the Missouri Department of Conservation archery device hunter safety course.

The authorized hunt must conform to the city ordinance allowing a deer archery hunt as well as all of the appropriate Missouri State Laws.

The city ordinance requires liability insurance of two million dollars, by the homeowner and/or the hunter.

The city ordinance specifies safety measures to be followed by the hunter, i.e. minimum heights for shooting stands, where arrows can be shot, etc.

The homeowner takes responsibility for all aspects of the hunt, including notification of all neighbors.

The city does not authorize hunting, only the homeowner can do that. The city does not issue a license or a hunting permit.

The City's permit is to allow the homeowner to have a hunt with the appropriate safeguards as specified by law. What the City does with its permit, is to ensure the citizen authorizing the hunt and the surrounding neighbors that it will be conducted in compliance with State Law and City Ordinance.

We are not suggesting these hunts will be a cure-all, however, over time it has helped maintain a more healthy deer population. So we can continue to enjoy the excitement of deer sightings. Just a reminder – the deer season for bow hunting opens September 15th if you are interested in a hunt on your property. Please contact City Hall for details.

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






MY SWIM WITH THE LARGEST FISH IN THE SEA

FINDING THE ADVENTURE ALONG THE WEST COAST OF AUSTRALIA



During the year I spent in Australia, I had the opportunity to do something incredible – one of those 'Bucket List', 'once-in-a-life-time'-type adventures. I swam with a whale shark.

Whale sharks are the largest fish on earth, growing up to 40 feet long and weighing up to 20 tons. They are filter feeders, meaning they only eat microscopic plankton that float near the surface of the ocean, and thus are harmless to larger animals, humans included. Between the months of March and June, they feed along the Ningaloo Reef- a World Heritage marine park off the west coast of Australia, providing thrill-seekers heart-stopping opportunities to come face-to-face with the largest fish in the sea. Sign.me.UP!!!

Upon arriving in Exmouth - a seaside town that springs to life during whale shark season - I booked my excursion with a local operator and went to bed with visions of whale sharks swimming through my head.

The next morning, after check-in at the office and a short ride to the beach, we hopped on a zodiac and sped through the surf out to the larger vessel. Whale sharks are so big, companies use spotter planes to locate them on the reef, which relay their position to the boats below. All you have to do is sit, and wait...

"WHALE SHARK!!!!"

The shout came down from the spotter perched atop the boat's observation deck. The plane overhead had identified a massive

shadow moving through the swirl, and the boat leaped into action, quickly moving into position. Adrenaline surging, we grabbed snorkels and masks, jamming on fins as the boat moved into the path of the advancing shadow...

"Go! Go! GO!" was the order, and it was off the back of the boat and into the churning foam, scrambling to get away from the boat, struggling to keep our snorkels above the waves...

Away from the chaos of the boat, it was calm, quiet. Suspended in depthless blue, bobbing at the surface of the sea, holding my breath and watching... Waiting... I could HEAR my heart pounding... It was INTENSE.

And then, there it was- this MASSIVE, spotted leviathan, emerging out of the blue, bearing down on me, it's gigantic mouth agape as it feasted on krill floating at the surface... It was beautiful. It was graceful. It was HUGE - and it was coming right at me!

Oblivious to my presence, it was on me - past me - with one swoosh of its towering tail... Gasping for air, all I could do was turn, kick, try to keep up as it glided effortlessly by.

"KEEP SWIMMING!!!" came the shouts from the boat as I sucked air through my snorkel and churned at the water, all the while entranced by this enormous, beautiful animal.

Quickly, it was beyond me, vanishing back into the blue as mysteriously as it had appeared. The boat circled back and plucked

us from the sea, only to repeat the process again. This went on for an hour, providing four or five breath-taking and lung-busting opportunities to swim with the giant fish. It was exhausting; it was exciting; it was EXHILARATING!

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Congrats, Kevin Brennan!

Beloved Swim Coach at Forest Hills Country Club Celebrates 40 Years and Becomes Honorary Citizen of Clarkson Valley

Dan Gable, Vince Lombardi, Nick Saban, Pat Summitt, Scotty Bowman, Eddie Robinson, Bobby Knight. Who comes to mind when you think of the greatest coaches of all time? Whatever your answer is, there's one more name you might want to add to the list.

The Swim Facility at Forest Hills Country Club broke ground in 2011. Following its completion in 2013, and with a recommendation by the Swim Committee, the Board unanimously voted to rename the facility in Kevin's Honor - commemorating his 35 years of service to the Club. The new name would be the Kevin Brennan Aquatic Center. It's hard to believe anything can top an amazing accomplishment, but 5 years later, Kevin is still breaking records. This summer marked Kevin Brennan's 40th year as the Swim Coach for Forest Hills Country Club.

On top of that, this July Kevin won his 300th meet which equates to 300 wins out of about 340 meets; an amazing 88% win percentage. Kevin's team won its first all Country Club Conference Meet back in 1991. Of the 28 all Country Club Conference Meets held since 1991, Kevin's teams have won an impressive 19 of those meets including this years. He holds the current record of 11 wins in a row which is now the longest continuous streak that anyone has ever had.

Greenbriar Country Club ended the original streak of 8 in 1999 and went on to win 9 in a row until Forest Hills regained the title in 2008. Since that time, every year has been a win under his belt. Kevin marked a huge milestone with the win in 2017 that marked the 10th in a row which became the longest streak in the history of the league at that time. Our swimmers extended that streak for Kevin this year with their 11th consecutive win.

It's hard to grasp the amount of lives Kevin has affected during his 40 years at Forest Hills, but it's without a doubt, in the thousands. No Country Club in the St. Louis area has ever been able to celebrate an accomplishment like this. What a way to cap off 40 years as the Swim Coach for Forest Hills Country Club.

Coach Kevin summed up his accomplishments with a simple quote... "Winning Never Gets Old."




A Conversation Between Annabelle Miller & Her Gram Pam

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

We have been along for some of the journey of the Blanner family's renovation of their Forest Hills home. This month, we get an inside peek at one of the mostused rooms in the house – the laundry room!

Julie wanted to open the room up a little, create workspace and make it feel like a charming cottage kitchen. It felt dark and small, yet has one of the best views in the house! To keep the makeover manageable, she divided the room into three sections so she could focus on their needs for each individual space at a time. She started with the "closet" which provides them with storage, and a place to sort and hang laundry.

She wanted a countertop height workspace in the laundry area because, with three girls, she has to spray endless amounts of clothing with stain remover. Keeping the washer and dryer at its original height not only grants her that space but also makes the cabinetry accessible.

Because it's a laundry room, they significantly limited their budget for the space. \$250 total, to be exact - lighting, accessories, paint, etc. She found a

polished brass faucet that wasn't her everything, but was only \$50! She updated the hardware with traditional brass pulls. The modern pulls made the cabinetry feel dated while the new pulls balance it and add a little classic charm. A dear friend was kind enough to make a skirt for the existing less-than-pretty utility sink, which not only disguised it but made it look beautiful!

The baskets on top of the cabinets are a perfect fit. They were originally used in the linen closet at their previous home and every chance she gets she stops by Home Goods to see if she can score two more! They're great for rarely used things like the girls' artwork and keepsakes.

The only thing left to do was to paint the window and replace the ceiling fan with the light fixture, and voila - a room that is a great space to do laundry in.




BALSAMIC PEARLS



GASTRONOMIC FUN DAY

Mom always said not to play with your food but sometimes you just need to be a rebel. Grab the kids and experiment in the kitchen. The family who cooks together eats together!

I found this recipe while cruising the internet for something new and trending. We've all read about the Instapot, vegetable spiralizer, and air fryer craze. Not to be forgotten are the current happening foods like turmeric and tahini. Many of these things will be gone before Thanksgiving but it's a fun change of pace.



We love balsamic vinegar at our house. We use it on anything from appetizers to dessert. I found this cute little twist for anything you add balsamic vinegar to - caprese salad, roasted beet salad, balsamic chicken breasts, strawberries and balsamic, etc. Balsamic pearls are fun to make and give an interesting presentation to your plate. The kids will love making these little gems.

The only ingredient you probably don't have on hand is agar powder. It is a gelatinous substance extracted from red seaweed and used as a thickener in foods. It is used in many Asian dishes. It can be found in most Asian markets or your handy dandy internet store. It's relatively inexpensive and can be purchased in small quantities.

Have fun playing with your food. Let me know how it turns out!

INGREDIENTS AND DIRECTIONS:

- 1 cup balsamic vinegar
- 1 tablespoon agar powder
- 2 cups chilled olive oil
- 1. Place the olive oil in a tall glass container and place in the freezer for at least 30 minutes. (I have done it for up to an hour) The oil should be cloudy and opaque throughout. Using a tall as opposed to a wide container allows the balsamic solution time to chill as it drops from the pipette.
- 2. Whisk the agar powder into the balsamic vinegar and bring the solution to a boil. Boil for 1-2 minutes, whisking vigorously. This will allow the agar time to fully saturate the liquid.
- 3. Let the solution cool for 5 minutes, or to about 130 degrees, stirring occasionally. Using a pipette or large syringe drip the vinegar mixture into the chilled olive oil slowly (the droplets will mesh together if you drop them into the oil too quickly). Using a fine mesh sieve, drain and gently rinse the pearls with water. Use to garnish your dish or store covered in the refrigerator.


