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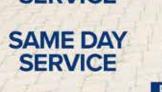

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mayor's corner summer KFFI ECTIUN

As summer approaches, a look back at last year's summer is a sobering reflection. It seems like a giant ball has been lifted off our shoulders (you may describe it differently, but we know what we mean). With the future and this virus still unclear, will our enthusiasm be justified and will we be wise in our actions? This remains a concern, not only individually, but for the entire world. I am no psychologist. I took one or two psychology courses in college, so the following remarks do not come with any authoritative endorsement. Rather, they come from my life's experience and my tenure as mayor.

I have been your mayor for over 30 years. That can be called a lot of experience. We value experience as a tool in doing our job, in living a more enjoyable life, provided it's not the same year over 30 times. Well, the COVID-19 required changes in our daily lives, the simple things (e.g., going to the grocery store). How did we adjust to the more serious changes - work-related, inner actions with friends and loved ones? Approaching a new or unfamiliar situation, we subconsciously trigger a set of emotions. I believe we approach it with our own expectations. COVID-19 has required many changes in our lifestyles. As the threat diminishes, what is the "new normal"? How do we accept more possible changes in our work, our play, and our personal relationships? During the restrictions on activities, what happened? Did your work environment structure change? Did you learn or find new methods for your job? How about your personal relationships with your children, with your significant other, discover anything? How about government, federal, state, local...what were your expectations, and how were they answered?

The range of answers to those questions will, I am sure, run the gamut of emotions. Why? Let's get to my analysis of that question. An example: When you are advised of a decision that affects you (e.g., a new ordinance restricting something), how do you react? Throughout our lives, we develop the rules (or principles) by which we will live. They will, if you will, become the basis of our decisions. And to me, they also provide the first question we ask ourselves, not verbally, but automatically "what am I expecting?" Think about it most human communications evolve around "expectation." You have an expectation when you contact your city, no matter the reason. And you weigh the answer based on that expectation. Do we, when addressing a problem situation, consider or adjust our expectations? Would it be helpful in solving problems (individual and/or group) by addressing them with a modified expectation? So often, the expectation is already the absolute answer. Can we modify our tribal nature to be more understanding to another view? Make expectations more open. I bet you do just that with your close relatives and/or friends. So those of you that have read this far - all this being said, you live in a city that has the benefit of you and your fellow citizens practicing open expectation to solving problems.

Successful WEIGHT LOSS Is a Journey

It's been a few months since I started my weight loss journey, and it is now time to share an update and to offer a look into what has worked for me! Let's start with the numbers. To date, I have lost 15 pounds! It has taken me nine weeks to do it, but I believe slow and steady is the best way, at least for me!

So how am I doing it? First, I am doing Noom® and loving it! What it has taught me has been beyond helpful! Now, I'm not saying you need to buy into a program to lose weight, but for me, it's been a game-changer! Here is how I've made it work:

1. Food Journal: If I eat it, it gets logged. You can do this with a simple notebook or an app such as

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myfitnesspal® or any other app out there that counts calories for you. I have limited myself most days to around 1200 calories, but it's different for everyone, and you should always check with your doctor on what the best calorie goal for you should be. I am not a doctor, just a neighbor sharing her story.

- 2. Scale: I weigh myself every single day. I can tell when I've had too much sodium, if my hormones are out of whack, etc. I log my weight, as well. It makes you more accountable for your journey by seeing those numbers daily.
- 3. Working Out: I try to do some sort of physical activity every single day, but there are a few days when I take a break, but most of the time you will see me walking daily through Forest Hills. I generally am walking four-and-a-half miles a day and average about 13,000 steps a day. I also do a circuit training class twice a week. It is great because it allows me to use weights to keep my muscles tone and lean.

Pretty simple! I never deprive myself of sweets, either, because who wants to miss out on the chocolate cake? Certainly not this girl! I love sweets! I just now plan for them! So for me, if I know I'm going out to dinner and will want that yummy dessert, I will pre-plan my day around it. I will keep my calorie intake for the day very low, so I can eat the cake and not blow my entire day. It has worked for me, and I am so happy that I finally found a balance.

Here is an example of one of my days eating, so you can see exactly how I've done it:

Breakfast:

· Two packages of Quaker Instant Oatmeal Cinnamon & Spice 320 calories

Lunch:

- Yoplait[®] Light Very Vanilla Yogurt 90 calories
- Cantaloupe chunks 35 calories
- · Honeydew melon chunks 15 calories

Dinner:

- Dinner roll 83 calories
- Grilled chicken breast (5 oz.) 335 calories
- Steamed broccoli 54 calories
- Chocolate cake (half slice) 268 calories

This day added up to exactly 1200 calories! Some days I have more, some days I have less, but I always enjoy what I'm eating! The other important component is *water*! I try to drink at least 50 ounces of water a day. I had to get used to it because I've never been a big water drinker. I can tell a huge difference in how my body works from just having more hydration!

The biggest thing I have given up on this journey is soda. This was the single most difficult thing for me. I absolutely love Dr. Pepper. It is my weakness. I use to drink about three 12-ounce cans a day. That's a ton of sugar and empty calories! At 120 calories a can, it was just sucking up my day. Now I will treat myself to a mini can every couple of days. On the other days, I drink sparkling ice with caffeine to get my "fix," and it works for me.

I still have some work to do; I want to lose about 10 more pounds, but I am thrilled with how this has gone for me so far! Once I hit my final goal, I will share my "before" and "after" pictures with all of you! Thanks for joining me on my weight loss journey! Here's to swimsuit season!

She assisted with opening St. Louis' first COVID evaluation tent on March 18, 2020, and has now come full circle with establishing Mercy's newest vaccination clinic, which opened March 24, 2021. Mercy now has three vaccination clinics in the St Louis area: a site at the main hospital, a location in Kirkwood, and now Chesterfield. These three sites allow Mercy to vaccinate more than 2,500 patients per day.

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Latasha says, "It is incredibly rewarding to have been involved with every aspect of COVID. I'm fortunate to be in a position where I can be a resource to get us to our new normal." Great job Latasha-Clarkson Valley is proud to have you in our community!

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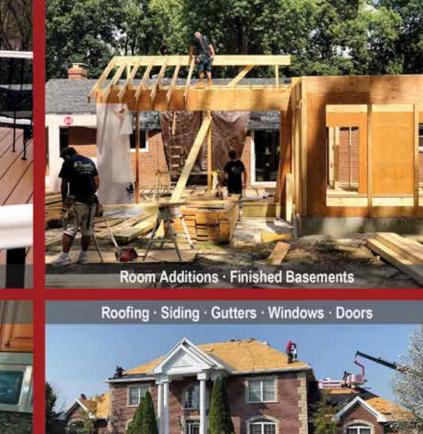




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
